## News Media Information

**KINNICK STADIUM** is located on the west campus in the heart of the University's athletic complex. It is a few minutes' drive from Interstate 80 and the Iowa City airport, about 30 minutes from the Cedar Rapids airport.

**PRESSBOX** at the stadium is on the west side and accessible by elevator. One of the nation's finest, it was completed in 1958 at a cost of \$490,000 (cost to build Kinnick Stadium was \$500,000 in 1929). The first deck has 89 seats for working press. The second deck contains ten booths for radio and television. The third and four levels have photo and radio booths and VIP areas. A pregame lunch is served on the first and second decks. The pressbox is 100 feet high and extends between the 25-yard lines.

**PRESS TICKET** requests should be directed to George Wine, sports information director. Requests should be filed early enough in advance to allow time for processing.

**ATHLETIC OFFICES** are located on the east side of the Iowa Field House. The Field House is also on the west campus, near the stadium.



## The Athletic Director

CHALMERS (BUMP) ELLIOTT is in his seventh year as Iowa's top athletic administrator. He was appointed to the position June 11, 1970, and oversees a staff of 35 men, 11 intercollegiate sports, and a large physical plant.



Bump's rise through the Big Ten ranks has been punctuated with success at every stop. Highlights of his tenure at Iowa include seven Big Ten championships in three sports plus two NCAA wrestling titles.

Elliott has been personally involved in four Big Ten football titles and four Rose Bowl appearances. He was an assistant coach at Iowa for five years and helped build the Hawkeyes into the power of the Big Ten that began with league and bowl championships in 1956.



Iowa won two more Big Ten crowns in the next four years, but Bump was tapped by his alma mater, Michigan, to join the staff there in 1957. He became head coach two years later, and his term as Wolverine boss was highlighted by conference and Rose Bowl wins in 1964. Elliott's 10-year record was 51-42-2 when he quit coaching after the 1968 season to accept administrative duties. After 18 months as Michigan's associate AD, he became athletic director at Iowa.

Elliott played three sports at Michigan in 1946-47-48. A brilliant halfback, he topped the Big Ten in scoring in 1947 with 54 points and spurred the Wolverines to Big Ten and Rose Bowl championships. He led his team in pass receiving and averaged more than five yards a carry. He earned All-America honors, as did his brother Pete, a Michigan quarterback. Bump also played parts of two seasons (1943-44) as a Marine trainee at Purdue. He was selected the Big Ten's MVP in 1947.

Elliott's first coaching job was as an assistant at Oregon State (1948-51). Then he served on the staffs at Iowa (1952-56) and Michigan (1957-58) before becoming head coach there.


Bump is a native of Bloomington, Ill. His father, Dr. J. Norman Elliott, was a physician there and also coached at Illinois Wesleyan and Northwestern. Bump was discharged from the Marines in 1946 and received his degree at Michigan in 1948. He and his wife Barbara have three children: Bill, Bob, and Betsy. Bump was born in Detroit January 30, 1925.

## The Head Coach

BOB COMMINGS has moved his Iowa football program in the right direction since he became head coach. He inherited a team that had gone winless in 1973 and almost immediately put it on the right track by upsetting nationally ranked UCLA. Bob's first two Iowa teams have had identical 3-8 records, and both finished in a tie for seventh in the Big Ten. But progress since Commings' arrival has been substantial in the face of very difficult schedules. The defense has toughened up and the Hawkeyes had a robust offense at the end of last season. Iowa has played interesting and entertaining football under Bob and the future looks bright.



Success at Iowa is nothing new to Commings, who enjoyed plenty as a player. The smallest lineman in the Big Ten at 173 pounds, Bob was a junior

guard on Iowa's Big Ten and Rose Bowl championship team of 1956. The following season he won all-conference honors and was named his team's most valuable player. The Hawkeyes had a record of 16-2-1 in Bob's last two years at Iowa.

Bob finished his undergraduate work at Iowa and stayed on to serve as an assistant freshman coach two seasons. He left coaching for a brief time, then took over at Struthers, Ohio, in 1962 and in the next seven years compiled a record of 50-16-4. That was good enough to earn him a shot at the top job in the state: Washington High School in Massillon. In five seasons at the tradition-rich high school, Commings produced a record of 44-5-1 and had the state championship team in 1970, when he earned coach of the year honors. His total high school record is 94-21-5.

Bob is a native of Youngstown, Ohio, where he was an all-state football guard and a baseball shortstop. He enrolled at Iowa in 1952, won a letter the next season, then spent two years in the Army in Europe. He is married to the former Sharon McGinnis of Iowa City. The couple has two sons, Bob Jr. and Don.

An entertaining public speaker, Bob has appeared before literally thousands of persons since taking the Iowa job December 14, 1973. One of several former Massillon coaches now in major college or professional football, Bob is big on physical conditioning and regularly plays paddleball and tennis. He is the fifth former Hawkeye to coach at his alma mater. Commings was born December 24, 1932, in Youngstown, Ohio.


## Coaching Staff

### **Larry Coyer** Defensive Coordinator





### **Larry Donovan** Offensive Line

A graduate of Nebraska, where he was president of the lettermen's club, Donovan started his coaching career there as a graduate assistant. He was on the staffs at South Dakota and Washington State before his appointment at Iowa February 10, 1976. As an army lieutenant, he coached a service team to an unbeaten season while serving in Korea. He and his wife Georgia have two daughters, Andrea and Molly. Born 3/31/41.

### **Dennis Green** Receivers

A former Hawkeye who ranks tenth on Iowa's career scoring list, Green was a graduate assistant at his alma mater before serving on the Dayton staff. ## **Gus Pachis**


### **Linebackers**


## **Kent Stephenson**


### **Varsity Reserves**

## The Outlook

In two seasons under Coach Bob Commings, the Hawkeyes have turned in identical 3-8 records and finished in a seventh place tie in the Big Ten both years. That's where the similarity ends.

Bob's 1974 Hawkeyes had a good blend of passing and running, a porous defense against the run, and were fragmented by injuries at season's end. Last year's club never did find a passing attack to go with a strong running game, toughened up its rushing defense and finished the season strong. Iowa was in all but two games last year and improved substantially in most statistical categories.

Approaching his third season as head coach, Commings believes this will be a better Iowa team than either of his first two. "I think we will be improved, and I hope the record reflects it," says Bob. "We were much more competitive last year than 1974. Our defense was much better and at the end of the season we had the second-best offense in the Big Ten."

Personnel losses are considerable. Six starters on each side of the line of scrimmage are gone. Nine of the graduates had sufficient talent to sign professional contracts, and three went in the first two rounds of the NFL draft. Linebacker and the offensive line need special attention.

The schedule includes three ranked teams on consecutive weekends. Playing Penn State, Southern Cal, and Ohio State in order is not recommended as a rebuilding formula. If the Hawkeyes survive the first half of the season, they'll surely be better for the finish.

**THE OFFENSE:** The Hawkeyes struggled in the first seven games last year, scoring only 72 points, then hit their final four foes with a 110-point barrage,

winning two and losing two by a total of five points. What happened? Butch Caldwell was inserted at quarterback, Dave Schick at tailback (both return), and Iowa, previously a wing-T team, began utilizing lots of I-formation.

A reckless runner, Schick wound up leading Iowa in rushing. He and Caldwell are both explosive players, and their presence adds considerable home run punch. Commings will utilize their skills by sticking mostly with the I-formation.

Tom McLaughlin, who started the first seven games in 1975, will come off knee surgery to battle Caldwell for the quarterback job. Regardless who wins it, the Hawkeyes need to sharpen a passing game that netted only 597 yards and three touchdowns last year. There are some good, veteran wide receivers, namely Bill Schultz and Jim McNulty, although Schultz may convert to wingback.

Ernie Sheeler and Jon Lazar give

solid depth at tailback. Sophomore Tom Rusk takes over at fullback, where Mark Fetter and Bob Holmes operated the past two seasons. Jim Jensen, the No. 2 rusher last year, has also departed.

The line will be without all-Americans Rod Walters at tackle and Joe Devlin at guard. Co-Capt. Jim Hilgenberg will be the Big Ten's best center, according to Commings, but all the other starters in the line are gone. Progress in the spring was encouraging, however.

**THE DEFENSE:** Although they improved in this area last year, the Hawkeyes yielded too many points. They held opponents to less than three touchdowns only twice, and too often let foes off the hook on third down plays.

If some young linebackers come through, all that should change, and Iowa could have its best defense in many years. The overall speed is excellent, there are plenty of big linemen and the secondary has experience. During the spring a conversion was made from a 5-2 alignment to a 4-3 (four linemen, three linebackers).

Tackle Lester Washington returns after a year off following knee surgery. Doug Benschoter and Dan Schultz played solid football as freshmen. Nate Washington, 6-6, is the kind of end who bothers quarterbacks. Veteran Rick Marsh and sophomores Bobby Hill and Joe Hufford will give the front four plenty of punch.

Senior veterans in the secondary are Shanty Burks (third in tackles last year), Co-Capt. Jim Caldwell and Roger Stech. Chuck Danzy got a lot of playing time as a freshman. Walk-on Dave Becker was so impressive in the spring that he is being listed as the starting free safety.

Top candidates at linebacker are Dean Moore (moved from defensive end), and sophs Mike Jackson (brother

of Andre), and Steve Vazquez. Leven Weiss, a second-semester freshman, is listed as a starter. Versatile Cornell Richardson, who has worked at several positions, goes into the fall as an outside linebacker.

The top three linebackers are gone, including Andre Jackson, a four-year regular and Iowa's most valuable player last year. Also missing are middle guard Dave Bryant, who had a superb senior year, safety Rick Penney, and cornerback Bob Elliott.

**KICKING GAME:** There should be no problems in this area. Nick Quartaro, who has done all the placement and kickoff work for two years, returns for his senior season. He equalled school records for field goals in a game and a season in 1975. Dan Matter punched out a 38-yard average on 56 punts last year.

## Historical Highlights

- 1889—Played first intercollegiate football game.
- 1899—First undefeated season (8-0-1) was recorded under Coach Alden Knipe. Admitted to the Western Conference (Big Ten) Dec. 1.
- 1900—A share of the conference championship highlighted another unbeaten season.
- 1901—Loss to Minnesota ended string of 23 games without defeat.
- 1921—First unbeaten and untied team (7-0) was coached by Howard Jones and won clear Big Ten title.
- 1922—Another perfect season (7-0) included share of conference crown with Michigan.
- 1923—Loss to Illinois ended string of 20 straight victories.
- 1929—Suspended from Big Ten for one year.
- 1939—Dr. Eddie Anderson coached the Iron Men, led by halfback Nile Kinnick, recipient of the Heisman Trophy, the Maxwell Award, and the Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1952—Forest Evashevski named head coach.
- 1955—Guard Cal Jones received the Outland Award.
- 1956—Won the Big Ten and appeared in Rose Bowl for the first time. Finished 9-1 in all games and beat Oregon State at Pasadena.
- 1957—Tackle Alex Karras received the Outland Award.
- 1958—Big Ten champions again and made California a victim in the Rose Bowl. Honors included No. 1 ranking by the Football Writers and Grantland Rice trophy by Look Magazine. Led the nation in total offense. Quarterback Randy Duncan was named the Helms Foundation Player of the Year and received the Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1960—Shared the Big Ten title with Minnesota. Evashevski quit coaching to devote full time to the athletic directorship after the completion of 8-1 season.
- 1961—Shutout by Purdue ended string of 78 games in which one or more touchdowns were scored.
- 1963—Notre Dame game was canceled following the assassination of President Kennedy.
- 1964—Some 28 Iowa and Big Ten records were broken despite 3-6 season.
- 1968—Big Ten scoring and total-offense marks set by Hawkeyes.
- 1969—Black boycott disrupted spring practice.
- 1972—Iowa Stadium was renamed Kinnick Stadium in honor of Iowa's Heisman Trophy winner of 1939. AstroTurf was installed.
- 1973—Bob Commings was named head coach Dec. 15.

### Iowa in the Top Ten

Since the wire services began running polls 35 years ago, Iowa has ranked among the nation's top ten a half-dozen times. Additionally, the Hawkeyes were named national champions by the Football Writers Association in 1958. Here is the way Iowa has been ranked by the Associated Press and United Press International:



# Herky and the Hawkeyes

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawk-eye was originally applied to a hero in a fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Author Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived and hunted with them.



In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James G. Edwards of Ft. Madison. Edwards, editor of the *Ft. Madison Patriot*, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the *Burlington Hawk-Eye*. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name and were rewarded when territorial officials gave it their formal approval.

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawk, was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism. The impish hawk was an immediate hit and he acquired a name

through a state-wide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 25 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot with a black leather head and gold felt feathers. Since then Herky has become a familiar figure at Hawk-eye athletic events.

## Floyd of Rosedale

A bet in 1935 between Minnesota Governor Floyd B. Olson and Iowa Governor Clyde Herring gave birth to Floyd of Rosedale. Tensions between the two state universities had been running high and a wager was made in an effort to relieve the situation. After Iowa lost the game, Herring presented Olson with Floyd of Rosedale, a full-blooded champion pig and a brother of Blue Boy of Will Rogers' movie, "State Fair." Olson presented the pig to the University of Minnesota and commissioned St. Paul sculptor Charles Brioscho to capture Floyd's image. The result is a bronze pig 21 inches long and 15 inches high. Floyd is currently in residence in Minneapolis, but the Hawkeyes hope to regain possession of the pig this fall.
