News Media Information

KINNICK STADIUM is located on the west campus in the heart of the University's athletic complex. It is a few minutes' drive from Interstate 80 and the lowa City airport, about 30 minutes from the Cedar Rapids airport.

PRESSBOX at the stadium is on the west side and accessible by elevator. One of the nation's finest, it was completed in 1958 at a cost of \$490,000 (cost to build Kinnick Stadium was \$500,000 in 1929). The first deck has 89 seats for working press. The second deck contains ten booths for radio and television. The third and four levels have photo and radio booths and VIP areas. A pregame lunch is served on the first and second decks. The pressbox is 100 feet high and extends between the 25-yard lines.

PRESS TICKET requests should be directed to George Wine, sports information director. Requests should be filed early enough in advance to allow time for processing.

ATHLETIC OFFICES are located on the east side of the lowa Field House. The Field House is also on the west campus, near the stadium.



The Athletic Director

CHALMERS (BUMP) ELLIOTT is in his eighth year as lowa's top athletic administrator. He was appointed to the position June 11, 1970, and oversees a staff of 35 men, 11 intercollegiate sports, and a large physical plant.



Bump's rise through the Big Ten ranks has been punctuated with success at every stop. Highlights of his tenure at lowa include eight Big Ten championships in three sports plus two NCAA wrestling titles.

Elliott has been personally involved in four Big Ten football titles and four Rose Bowl appearances. He was an assistant coach at lowa for five years and helped build the Hawkeyes into the power of the Big Ten that began with league and bowl championships in 1956.

lowa won two more Big Ten crowns in the next four years, but Bump was

tapped by his alma mater, Michigan, to join the staff there in 1957. He became head coach two years later, and his term as Wolverine boss was highlighted by conference and Rose Bowl wins in 1964. Elliott's 10-year record was 51-42-2 when he quit coaching after the 1968 season to accept administrative duties. After 18 months as Michigan's associate AD, he became athletic director at lowa.


Elliott played three sports at Michigan in 1946-47-48. A brilliant halfback, he topped the Big Ten in scoring in 1947 with 54 points and spurred the Wolverines to Big Ten and Rose Bowl championships. He led his team in pass receiving and averaged more than five yards a carry. He earned All-America honors, as did his brother Pete, a Michigan quarterback. Bump also played parts of two seasons (1943-44) as a Marine trainee at Purdue. He was selected the Big Ten's MVP in 1947.


Elliott's first coaching job was as an assistant at Oregon State (1948-51). Then he served on the staffs at Iowa (1952-56) and Michigan (1957-58) before becoming head coach there.

Bump is a native of Bloomington, III. His father, Dr. J. Norman Elliott, was a physician there and also coached at Illinois Wesleyan and Northwestern. Bump was discharged from the Marines in 1946 and received his degree at Michigan in 1948. He and his wife Barbara have three children: Bill, Bob, and Betsy. All are married. Bump was born in Detroit January 30, 1925.

The Head Coach

BOB COMMINGS' football teams at lowa have made steady improvement in his three years as head coach. Bob faced the challenge of picking up the pieces following a winless 1973 season, but progress has been substantial in



the face of difficult schedules. Iowa upset nationally ranked UCLA in his second game as head coach. Last year the Hawkeyes took care of rated Penn State and pulled Big Ten upsets at Minnesota and Michigan State. Commings' three-year record is 11-22 in all games and 8-16 in the Big Ten. Following a 5-6 season in 1976, his Hawkeyes appear capable of breaking through the .500 barrier and into the Big Ten's first division this year.

Success at lowa is nothing new to Commings, who enjoyed plenty as a player. The smallest lineman in the Big Ten at 173 pounds, Bob was a junior

guard on lowa's Big Ten and Rose Bowl championship team of 1956. The following season he won all-conference honors and was named his team's most valuable player. The Hawkeyes had a record of 16-2-1 in Bob's last two years at lowa.

Bob finished his undergraduate work at lowa and stayed on to serve as an assistant freshman coach two seasons. He left coaching for a brief time, then took over at Struthers, Ohio, in 1962 and in the next seven years compiled a record of 50-16-4. That was good enough to earn him a shot at the top job in the state: Washington High School in Massillon. In five seasons at the tradition-rich high school, Commings produced a record of 44-5-1 and had the state championship team in 1970, when he earned coach of the year honors. His total high school record is 94-21-5.

Bob is a native of Youngstown, Ohio, where he was an all-state football guard and a baseball shortstop. He enrolled at lowa in 1952, won a letter the next season, then spent two years in the Army in Europe. He is married to the former Sharon McGinnis of Iowa City. The couple has two sons, Bob Jr. and Don.

An entertaining public speaker, Bob has appeared before literally thousands of persons since taking the lowa job December 14, 1973. One of several former Massillon coaches now in major college or professional football, Bob is big on physical conditioning and regularly plays paddleball and tennis. He is the fifth former Hawkeye to coach at his alma mater. Commings was born December 24, 1932, in Youngstown, Ohio.

Dave Beckman Offensive Backs



A native of Bellevue, Ohio, where he was an all-state lineman, Beckman went on to Baldwin-Wallace College and starred in football and track. He coached

in Ohio high schools at Youngstown, Warren and Akron after a year on the staff at Baldwin-Wallace. He came to lowa Dec. 21, 1973, after coaching at the college level at Adrian and Evansville. He and his wife Pat have two sons, Tim and Ted. Born 6/8/38.

Larry Coyer Defensive Coordinator



An outstanding defensive back and wrestler at Marshall, Coyer was named that school's athlete of the year as a senior. He served on the staff of his alma

mater, then look high school jobs at Martins Ferry and Massillon in Ohio. He was on Bob Commings' staff at Massillon. Coyer was at Bowling Green a year before joining the Iowa staff Dec. 20, 1973. He is a native of West Virginia. His wife's name is Linda. Born 4/19/43.

Larry Donovan Quarterbacks



A graduate of Nebraska, where he was president of the lettermen's club, Donovan started his coaching career there as a graduate assistant. He was on the staffs at South Dakota and Washington State before his appointment at lowa February 10, 1976. As an army lieutenant, he coached a service team to an unbeaten season while serving in Korea. He and his wife Georgia have two daughters, Andrea and Molly. Born 3/31/41.

Tom Hayes Defensive Backs



A fine defensive back at Iowa, Tom Hayes played for two Hawkeye teams that finished in the Big Ten's first division. He joined the Iowa staff in April,

1977, after coaching three years at Kuemper of Carroll. He has also served on the staffs at Regina of Iowa City, LaSalle of Cedar Rapids, and Coe College. An Atlantic native, Tom and his wife Cindy have one son, Andy. Born 3/26/49.

Paul Kemp Offensive Line



A former lowa quarterback, Paul Kemp joined the Hawkeye staff in April, 1977, after serving as head coach four years at Boston University. His

background includes staff assignments at Ball State, Arizona State, Iowa State, and Pittsburgh, plus a scouting job with the Atlanta Falcons. A native of Water-loo and an Army veteran, Paul and his wife Beth have three daughters: Michelle, Melinda, and Mellissa. Born 2/9/31.

Dan McCarney Offensive Line



A co-captain at Iowa in 1974 (Bob Commings' first season as head coach), Dan Mc-Carney was a solid performer at offensive guard who was later

drafted by the Atlanta Falcons. One of the most dedicated Hawkeyes of his era, he served his apprenticeship at lowa as a graduate assistant before joining the staff full-time in April, 1977. Dan is a bachelor and a native of lowa City. Born 7/28/53.

Gus Pachis Linebackers



A native of Massillon, Ohio, Pachis coached there and at Canton, Ohio, before joining the Iowa staff January 20, 1976. He was on the Massillon staff for

10 years, the last five while Bob Commings was head coach there. He is a graduate of Miami of Ohio and holds a master's degree from Akron. He and his wife Karen have a son, Trevor. Born 1/8/41.

Rich Solomon Receivers



Rich Solomon's biggest thrill as an lowa defensive back came in 1969 when he made a game-saving interception against Michigan State in a regionally televised game. He was a Hawkeye graduate assistant before serving on the staffs at Dubuque University and Southern Illinois. He joined the lowa staff in January, 1977. A New Orleans native, Rich is single. Born 12/8/49.

Bill Whisler Defensive Tackles



As an offensive end for the Hawkeyes, Whisler caught 30 passes for 444 yards and four touchdowns. He played in the North-South game following his

senior season. He played ten years in the Canadian League as a defensive end and made all-league four times. He played in the first Canadian all-star game. He was on the coaching staff at Yankton College before coming to iowa February 27, 1974. His wife's name is Earlyn. Born 11/15/40.

Bernie Wyatt Defensive Ends



An MVP for lowa as a junior in 1960, Wyatt was a defensive back who intercepted seven career passes and played in the Blue-Gray game following

his senior season. He coached at Regina of Iowa City and Lindenhurst, N.Y., before returning January 15, 1974, to coach at his alma mater. An all-American prep at Amityville, N.Y., he and his wife Barbara have two sons, Brad and Barry. Born 8/21/38.

Hall of Fame Hawkeyes

Eleven men who have been associated with Iowa football are members of the Hall of Fame, named by the National Football Foundation and/or the Helms Athletic Foundation.

Six men have been named to the Halls of both foundations: Howard Jones, coach; Nile Kinnick, player; Gordon Locke, player; Fred (Duke) Slater, player; Dr. Edward Anderson, coach; Edward (Slip) Madigan, coach.

Four men have been named to the Hall of the Helms Foundation: Calvin Jones, player; Ossie Solem, coach; Emlen Tunnell, professional player; Eric Wilson, publicist. Aubrey Devine was named to the NFF Hall as a player.

Kinnick Stadium

lowa Stadium was renamed in 1972 to honor Nile Kinnick, Heisman Trophy winner and star halfback of the legendary 1939 lowa Ironmen. The concensus all-American and Phi Beta Kappa scholar was killed when his plane went down at sea while he was serving in the Navy in World War II. Kinnick Stadium was built in 1929 at a cost of less than a half million dollars. It has undergone several major renovations and today has a capacity of some 60,000.

The Outlook

Some interesting numbers: Iowa has 42 lettermen and 15 starters returning from a team that finished 5-6 in 1976. Those are the kind of figures that bring optimism to any football program, and lowa is no exception.

"We believe we're going to have a good football team," says Bob Commings, whose Hawkeyes have improved steadily in his three years as head coach. Still, Iowa has finished in a tie for seventh place in the Big Ten in each of those seasons. Now Commings thinks his club has a realistic shot at the first division.

"Overall, this is the best squad we've had since I've been coach here," Bob explains. "We have more talent and depth. Physically, we will be a very strong team. People pretty much stopped pushing us around last year. We are bringing in the best crop of recruits I've seen at lowa during my playing or coaching days here. I think we'll be improved, and as I said last year, I hope this is reflected in our record at the end of the season."

The Hawkeyes have indeed made great progress since Commings and his staff arrived. In 1974, following an 0-11 season, Iowa managed to win three games but was blown off the field in several losses. The following season the Hawkeyes were much more competitive, although the record was again 3-8. Last year Iowa improved to 5-6 and was in all but two games. "We could have just as well been 8-3," reflects Commings.

Although he has 15 starters returning from the team that won at Michigan State to finish 1976, not all are listed as probable starters. That's a good indication of how competitive things are in the Hawkeye camp. Most observers think lowa's defense is considerably ahead of the offense but there is cer-

tainly enough experience on the attack-

The schedule is tough, as usual, and includes a revival of the lowa State series that has been dormant since 1934. UCLA and Arizona round out the nonconference slate. Every league opponent except Illinois is on the Big Ten schedule.

with a good quarterback, but Commings is unsure who will be his triggerman. Butch Caldwell, an exciting scrambler, is gone. Tom McLaughlin is a three-year letterman who started most of his sophomore season, but he will have to beat out Doug Piro, a senior with little experience. The freshman class includes three good prospects, but it's hard to count on rookies at this position.

A year ago lowa had virtually no experienced running backs or linemen, but now there are plenty of veterans at those spots. Fullback Jon Lazar led the Hawkeyes in rushing while Ernie Sheeler, Dennis Mosley, and Tommy

Renn shared the tailback spot. Doug Benschoter, a top defensive end, was switched to offensive guard in a key spring training move. He has some quality sidekicks in center Jim Hilgenberg, guard Mike Mayer, tackles Barry Tomasetti and Sam Palladino, and tight end Jim Swift.

lowa's passing game was sometimes sensational but inconsistent last season. Leading receivers Bill Schultz, an outstanding big-play man, and Tom Grine have departed. All returning running backs did a good job catching the ball, and Mike Brady is a fine split end. The addition of Brad Reid, who led national juco receivers in 1976, makes the picture encouraging.

"We won't have to ask so much of our QB this year because our offense will be stronger," predicts Commings. "We want the QB to be the trigger and not the bullet. We've also incorporated more wing-T into our attack. If we eliminate the errors we made last year we'll be OK on offense."

THE DEFENSE: The Hawkeyes ranked a solid third in total defense in the Big Ten last year, and coordinator Larry Coyer thinks his troops can move up a notch. Stats against scoring weren't as impressive, but the defenders were frequently placed in precarious positions by offensive or kicking errors.

Linebackers will be the strength, with two all-star candidates in Tom Rusk and Dean Moore. Mike Jackson is the third starter, and three vets will serve as backups. "We're two-deep and exceptionally solid at linebacker," says Commings.

Tackle Joe Hufford and end Steve Vazquez were the most consistent performers in the defensive line last year. They return, along with vets Joe Willis and Dan Schultz at tackles and Jim Molini and Steve Wagner at ends. Juco

transfer Darrell Hobbs plus an outstanding crop of big freshmen will help make lowa's front four all the more formidable.

Five members of the defensive secondary are former starters. Roger Stech and Dave Becker were sidelined by injuries but are healthy again. Rod Sears was a Big Ten co-leader in pass interceptions last year, and safety Cedric Shaw is a potential all-star. Chuck Danzy was a regular last year. Lettermen Chuck Sodergren and Mario Pace lend strong support.

"This is our second year with the 4-3, and our defense should be the best lowa has had in a long time," says Commings, who has made defense his No. 1 priority since the day he took the lowa job.

KICKING GAME: Record setter Nick Quartaro (placements and kickoffs) and consistent Dan Matter (punter) have both graduated. Dave Holsclaw, who averaged 42 yards on six punts last year, will take over that job. Scott Schilling, who booted a 46-yard field goal in the spring game, is the top candidate to replace Quartaro.

The Squad

COLLEGE—Switched from tailback, he is listed as the No. 3 fullback starting fall practice. Had 10 carries for 19 yards last year. Caught one pass for eight yards, and returned three kickoffs for 46 yards, with a long return of 36 yards. THE OUTLOOK-Chances for a turnaround in the Northwestern program in 1977 are slim. The Wildcats have won only 11 games in four years under Coach John Pont. Only one of those victories came last season, and graduated from that 1-10 team are Greg Boykin, the school's all-time leading rusher; Scott Yelvington, the all-time leading pass receiver; Rob Dean, the fourth-best career passer; and Pete Shaw, a two-time all-Big Ten safety. Still, the always-optimistic Pont sees glimmers of salvation. Nine linemen with some starting experience will provide the foundation for the offense. Split end Mark Bailey, who caught 32 passes last year, is one of them. Tailback Pat Geegan and fullback Jim Whims, who covered 942 yards between them in 1976, are also back. Steve Breitbeil and Scott Stranski are the frontrunners to succeed Dean in the quarterback role. Paul Maly, a threeyear starter at middle guard who has moved to linebacker, will anchor the defense. Three-time letterman Greg Stanley will be his counterpart. Both tackles and safeties also return.

1923-Loss to Illinois ended string of 20 straight victories.

1929-Suspended from Big Ten for one year.

1939-Dr. Eddie Anderson coached the Iron Men, led by halfback Nile Kinnick, recipient of the Heisman Trophy, the Maxwell Award, and the Walter Camp Trophy.

1952-Forest Evashevski named head coach.

1955-Guard Cal Jones received the Outland Award.

1956-Won the Big Ten and appeared in Rose Bowl for the first time. Finished 9-1 in all games and beat Oregon State at Pasadena.

1957-Tackle Alex Karras received the Outland Award.

1958-Big Ten champions again and made California a victim in the Rose Bowl. Honors included No. 1 ranking by the Football Writers and Grantland Rice trophy by Look Magazine. Led the nation in total offense. Quarterback Randy Duncan was named the Helms Foundation Player of the Year and received the Walter Camp Trophy.

1960-Shared the Big Ten title with Minnesota. Evashevski quit coaching to devote full time to the athletic directorship after the completion of 8-1 season.

1961-Shutout by Purdue ended string of 78 games in which one or more touchdowns were scored.

1963-Notre Dame game was canceled following the assassination of President Kennedy.

1964-Some 28 Iowa and Big Ten records were broken despite 3-6 season.

1968-Big Ten scoring and total-offense marks set by Hawkeyes.

1969—Black boycott disrupted spring practice.

1972-lowa Stadium was renamed Kinnick Stadium in honor of Iowa's Heisman Trophy winner of 1939. AstroTurf was installed.

1973-Bob Commings was named head coach Dec. 15.

Herky and the Hawkeyes

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawkeye was originally applied to a hero in a fictional novel, The Last of the Mohicans, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Author Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived and hunted with them.



In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of lowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James G. Edwards of Ft. Madison. Edwards, editor of the Ft. Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the Burlington Hawk-Eye. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name and were rewarded when territorial officials gave it their formal approval.

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawk, was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism. The impish hawk was an immediate hit and he acquired a name

through a state-wide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 25 years ago, Herky has symbolized lowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s Herky came to life at a football game as the lowa mascot with a black leather head and gold felt feathers. Since then Herky has become a familiar figure at Hawkeye athletic events.

Floyd of Rosedale

A bet in 1935 between Minnesota Governor Floyd B. Olson and Iowa Governor Clyde Herring gave birth to Floyd of Rosedale. Tensions between the two state universities had been running high and a wager was made in an effort to relieve the situation. After lowa lost the game, Herring presented Olson with Floyd of Rosedale, a fullblooded champion pig and a brother of Blue Boy of Will Rogers' movie, "State Fair." Olson presented the pig to the University of Minnesota and commissioned St. Paul sculptor Charles Brioscho to capture Floyd's image. The result is a bronze pig 21 inches long and 15 inches high. Floyd currently resides in lowa City as a result of last year's lowa victory.
