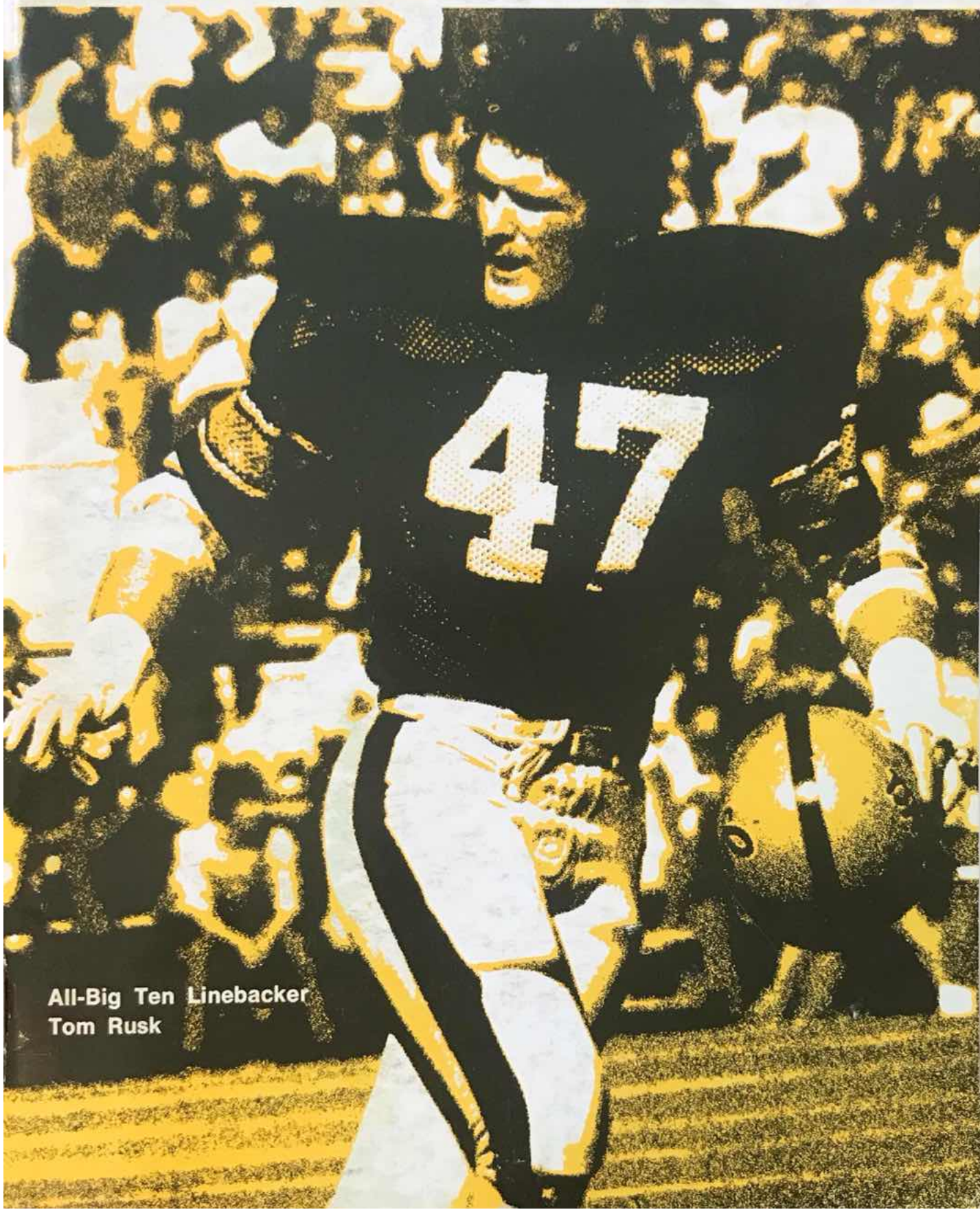

## News Media Information

**KINNICK STADIUM** is located on the west campus in the heart of the University's athletic complex. It is a few minutes' drive from Interstate 80 and the Iowa City airport, about 30 minutes from the Cedar Rapids airport.

**PRESSBOX** at the stadium is on the west side and accessible by elevator. One of the nation's finest, it was completed in 1958 at a cost of \$490,000 (cost to build Kinnick Stadium was \$500,000 in 1929). The first deck has 89 seats for working press. The second deck contains ten booths for radio and television. The third and four levels have photo and radio booths and VIP areas. A pregame lunch is served on the first and second decks. The press-box is 100 feet high and extends between the 25-yard lines.

**PRESS TICKET** requests should be directed to George Wine, sports information director. Requests should be filed early enough in advance to allow time for processing.

**ATHLETIC OFFICES** are located on the east side of the Iowa Field House. The Field House is also on the west campus, near the stadium.

## The Athletic Director

CHALMERS (BUMP) ELLIOTT is in his ninth year as Iowa's top athletic administrator. He was appointed to the position June 11, 1970, and oversees a staff of 35 men, 11 intercollegiate sports, and a large physical plant.



Bump's rise through the Big Ten ranks has been punctuated with success at every stop. Highlights of his tenure at Iowa include nine Big Ten championships in three sports plus three NCAA wrestling titles.

Elliott has been personally involved in four Big Ten football titles and four Rose Bowl appearances. He was an assistant coach at Iowa for five years and helped build the Hawkeyes into the power of the Big Ten that began with league and bowl championships in 1956.

Iowa won two more Big Ten crowns in the next four years, but Bump was tapped by his alma mater, Michigan, to join the staff there in 1957. He became head coach two years later, and his term as Wolverine boss was highlighted by conference and Rose Bowl wins in 1964. Elliott's 10-year record was 51-42-2 when he quit coaching after the 1968 season to accept administrative duties. After 18 months as Michigan's associate AD, he became athletic director at Iowa.

Elliott played three sports at Michigan in 1946-47-48. A brilliant halfback, he topped the Big Ten in scoring in 1947 with 54 points and spurred the Wolverines to Big Ten and Rose Bowl championships. He led his team in pass receiving and averaged more than five yards a carry. He earned All-America honors, as did his brother Pete, a Michigan quarterback. Bump also played parts of two seasons (1943-44) as a Marine trainee at Purdue. He was selected the Big Ten's MVP in 1947.

Elliott's first coaching job was as an assistant at Oregon State (1948-51). Then he served on the staffs at Iowa (1952-56) and Michigan (1957-58) before becoming head coach there.

Bump is a native of Bloomington, Ill. His father, Dr. J. Norman Elliott, was a physician there and also coached at Illinois Wesleyan and Northwestern. Bump was discharged from the Marines in 1946 and received his degree at Michigan in 1948. He and his wife Barbara have three children: Bill, Bob, and Betsy. All are married. Bump was born in Detroit January 30, 1925.

## The Head Coach

BOB COMMINGS begins his fifth season as head coach with high hopes of piloting the Hawkeyes to a winning year and first-division finish in the Big Ten. Progress has been substantial since Bob took over at Iowa following a



winless 1973 campaign. The schedule, always tough, has not prevented the Hawkeyes from becoming a highly competitive team under Commings. It looked like Iowa was ready to break the .500 barrier last year after opening with two victories, but six losses in the next seven games ended those ambitions. Nobody was more disappointed than Commings, whose four-year record at Iowa is 15-29 in all games and 11-21 in the Big Ten. Bob has spurred the Hawkeyes to some satisfying upsets, such as victories over UCLA, Penn State, Iowa State, Minnesota, and Michigan State.

Success at Iowa is nothing new to Commings, who enjoyed plenty as a player. The smallest lineman in the Big Ten at 173 pounds, Bob was a junior guard on Iowa's Big Ten and Rose Bowl championship team of 1956. The following season he won all-conference honors and was named his team's most valuable player. The Hawkeyes had a record of 16-2-1 in Bob's last two years at Iowa.

Bob finished his undergraduate work at Iowa and stayed on to serve as an assistant freshman coach two seasons. He left coaching for a brief time, then took over at Struthers, Ohio, in 1962 and in the next seven years compiled a record of 50-16-4. That was good enough to earn him a shot at the top job in the state: Washington High School in Massillon. In five seasons at the tradition-rich high school, Commings produced a record of 44-5-1 and had the state championship team in 1970, when he earned coach of the year honors. His total high school record is 94-21-5.

Bob is a native of Youngstown, Ohio, where he was an all-state football guard and a baseball shortstop. He enrolled at Iowa in 1952, won a letter the next season, then spent two years in the Army in Europe. He is married to the former Sharon McGinnis of Iowa City. The couple has two sons, Bob Jr., an Iowa quarterback, and Don.

An entertaining public speaker, Bob has appeared before literally thousands of persons since taking the Iowa job December 14, 1973. One of several former Massillon coaches now in major college or professional football, Bob is big on physical conditioning and regularly plays paddleball and tennis. He is the fifth former Hawkeye to coach at his alma mater. Commings was born December 24, 1932, in Youngstown, Ohio.



## Coaching Staff

### Dave Beckman Offensive Line



A native of Bellevue, Ohio, where he was an all-state lineman, Beckman went on to Baldwin-Wallace College and starred in football and track. He coached

in Ohio high schools at Youngstown, Warren and Akron after a year on the staff at Baldwin-Wallace. He came to Iowa Dec. 21, 1973, after coaching at the college level at Adrian and Evansville. He and his wife Pat have two sons, Tim and Ted. Born 6/8/38.

### Tom Cecchini Defensive Coordinator



This is the second time around on the Iowa staff for Cecchini, who was Hawkeye linebacker coach in 1974-75. He then served two years as defensive co-

ordinator at Tulane. Cecchini (pronounced cha-KEE-nee) was an all-Big Ten linebacker and captain at Michigan for Bump Elliott. He was head coach at Xavier two years. Tom and his wife Lynn have two sons, David and Jason. Born 9/12/46.

### Larry Donovan Quarterbacks



A graduate of Nebraska, where he was president of the lettermen's club, Donovan started his coaching career there as a graduate assistant. He was on

the staffs at South Dakota and Washington State before his appointment at Iowa February 10, 1976. As an army lieutenant, he coached a service team to an unbeaten season while serving in Korea. He and his wife Georgia have two daughters, Andrea and Molly. Born 3/31/41.

### Tom Hayes Defensive Backs



A fine defensive back at Iowa, Tom Hayes played for two Hawkeye teams that finished in the Big Ten's first division. He joined the Iowa staff in April,

1977, after coaching three years at Kuemper of Carroll. He has also served on the staffs at Regina of Iowa City, LaSalle of Cedar Rapids, and Coe College. An Atlantic native, Tom and his wife Cindy have one son, Andy. Born 3/26/49.

### Paul Kemp Offensive Backs



A former Iowa quarterback, Paul Kemp joined the Hawkeye staff in April, 1977, after serving as head coach four years at Boston University. His

background includes staff assignments at Ball State, Arizona State, Iowa State, and Pittsburgh, plus a scouting job with the Atlanta Falcons. A native of Waterloo and an Army veteran, Paul and his wife Beth have three daughters: Michelle, Melinda, and Melissa. Born 2/9/31.



## **Dan McCarney**

### **Offensive Line**



A co-captain at Iowa in 1974 (Bob Comings' first season as head coach), Dan McCarney was a solid performer at offensive guard who was later

drafted by the Atlanta Falcons. One of the most dedicated Hawkeyes of his era, he served his apprenticeship at Iowa as a graduate assistant before joining the staff full-time in April, 1977. Dan is a bachelor and a native of Iowa City. Born 7/28/53.

## **Gus Pachis**

### **Linebackers**



A native of Massillon, Ohio, Pachis coached there and at Canton, Ohio, before joining the Iowa staff January 20, 1976. He was on the Massillon staff for

10 years, the last five while Bob Comings was head coach there. He is a graduate of Miami of Ohio and holds a master's degree from Akron. He and his wife Karen have a son, Trevor. Born 1/8/41.

## **Rich Solomon**

### **Receivers**



Rich Solomon's biggest thrill as an Iowa defensive back came in 1969 when he made a game-saving interception against Michigan State in a region-

ally televised game. He was a Hawkeye graduate assistant before serving on the staffs at Dubuque University and Southern Illinois. He joined the Iowa staff in January, 1977. A New Orleans native, Rich is single. Born 12/8/49.

## **Bill Whisler**

### **Defensive Tackles**



As an offensive end for the Hawkeyes, Whisler caught 30 passes for 444 yards and four touchdowns. He played in the North-South game following his senior season. He played ten years in the Canadian League as a defensive end and made all-league four times. He played in the first Canadian all-star game. He was on the coaching staff at Yankton College before coming to Iowa February 27, 1974. He and his wife Earlyn have a daughter, Neeley. Born 11/15/40.

## **Bernie Wyatt**

### **Defensive Ends**



An MVP for Iowa as a junior in 1960, Wyatt was a defensive back who intercepted seven career passes and played in the Blue-Gray game following his senior season. He coached at Regina of Iowa City and Lindenhurst, N.Y., before returning January 15, 1974, to coach at his alma mater. An all-American prep at Amityville, N.Y., he and his wife Barbara have two sons, Brad and Barry. Born 8/21/38.

## Hall of Fame Hawkeyes

Eleven men who have been associated with Iowa football are members of the Hall of Fame, named by the National Football Foundation and/or the Helms Athletic Foundation.

Six men have been named to the Halls of both foundations: Howard Jones, coach; Nile Kinnick, player; Gordon Locke, player; Fred (Duke) Slater, player; Dr. Edward Anderson, coach; Edward (Slip) Madigan, coach.

Four men have been named to the Hall of the Helms Foundation: Calvin Jones, player; Ossie Solem, coach; Emlen Tunnell, professional player; Eric Wilson, publicist. Aubrey Devine was named to the NFF Hall as a player.

## Kinnick Stadium

Iowa Stadium was renamed in 1972 to honor Nile Kinnick, Heisman Trophy winner and star halfback of the legendary 1939 Iowa Ironmen. The consensus all-American and Phi Beta Kappa scholar was killed when his plane went down at sea while he was serving in the Navy in World War II. Kinnick Stadium was built in 1929 at a cost of less than a half million dollars. It has undergone several major renovations and today has a capacity of some 60,000.

## The Outlook

There are several reasons Coach Bob Commings thinks this could be his turnaround year at Iowa. First of all, the Hawkeyes have become more competitive in each of Bob's four years at Iowa. Second, this is Commings' club; he and his staff recruited every member of the squad. Third, this is the first time Bob has had a senior-dominated team, one whose leaders will be mature veterans.

"I'll say it again," predicts Commings, slipping in his only qualification for a successful season: "If we can field a healthy football team this fall we will be good."

Injuries certainly cut down on the Hawkeyes' effectiveness last season, especially on offense. The absence of tailback Dennis Mosley took away the outside and home run threat, and a series of ailments in the line hurt the consistency of the running game.

"I thought our running game showed real improvement during spring practice," reports Commings. "I'm encouraged about progress there. We had a good spring practice in all areas. The attitude was good, we did a lot of teaching and we made a lot of progress."

Failure to win a couple of close games last year cost the Hawkeyes a winning season. To break the .500 barrier, Iowa must jazz up its running game and improve a pass defense that was often burned in 1977. For the passing game to be as good as last year, a replacement must be found for quarterback Tom McLaughlin. Defense against the run could be Iowa's best ever.

The schedule offers the usual stiff challenges and includes the perennial Big Ten leaders, Ohio State and Michigan. Illinois is the only conference opponent not on the slate. Nonleague foes are Iowa State, Arizona, and Utah.

**THE OFFENSE:** Although he missed three games because of injury, Tom McLaughlin passed for more than 1,000 yards and had a 51 percent completion rate. His arm put punch in the wing-T attack and replacing him is vital to Iowa's success. Four candidates are standing in line but the two who appear to have the inside track are Bobby Commings and Jeff Green. Both are sophomores. Commings directed Iowa to victory over Iowa State last year when McLaughlin was sidelined.

Speedy Dennis Mosley, injured much of last year, keys the running game, although fullback Jon Lazar is also back (he has been the rushing leader two straight seasons). Mosley has the potential to break the 1,000-yard barrier. The coaching staff thinks wingback Jim Frazier is a budding star, but he must rebound from knee surgery.

Frazier is backed up by Rod Morton,

who had Iowa's only 100-yard game last year. Neither reserve tailback, Dennis Martin or Milton Turner, has experience. The reserve fullbacks are Dean McKillip, who played some as a freshman, and huge Bill Harmon, a transfer from Ohio State.

Tight end Jim Swift, going into his junior year, may be on the verge of stardom. Brad Reid and Mike Brady are sure-handed, veteran wide receivers. The offensive line will feature another Hilgenberg at center (this one is Jay), but the other names are not so familiar although there is a fair amount of experience in the group.

**THE DEFENSE:** Iowa has a new coordinator, Tom Cecchini, and although he will continue to go with the 4-3 front that's been tough against the run, he's switched to zone coverage in the secondary. If that move noticeably improves the pass defense, then the Hawkeyes will be very difficult to attack.

At middle linebacker, Tom Rusk is the heart of the defense. His presence gives the Hawkeyes some latitude other teams may not enjoy. Around him, however, are some very talented and large veterans. Darrell Hobbs, Steve Vazquez, and Steve Wagner give Iowa a trio of tough, experienced ends.

In Commings's first year at Iowa he was looking for anybody, but ANYBODY, to play tackle. Now he has four big, proven men at that position. John Harty won all-Big Ten honors as a freshman and seems ticketed for stardom. Joe Hufford and Doug Benschoter return for their senior seasons, and Mark Mahmens came on rapidly as a sophomore last year.

There are six veteran linebackers, including Rusk. Leven Weiss and Tim Gutshall are listed as the top outside backers, but Jim Molini, switched from end, is certain to be a factor once he

adjusts to the position. Bobby Hill and Bryan Skradis are lettermen who strengthen this spot.

The secondary may not be the swiftest in the Big Ten, but it does have four starters with considerable experience. Cedric Shaw and Mario Pace line up at the corners, while Dave Becker and Charles Danzy are the safeties. The Ellis twins, Kent and Kevin, developed rapidly as freshmen, but there are no other lettermen.

**KICKING GAME:** Dave Holsclaw was ticketed to handle Iowa's punting game last year, which he did in fine style. He was also pressed into duty as a kickoff and placement specialist and proceeded to break three school field-goal records. He may handle everything again this season unless Scott Schilling beats him out of the placement job. Schilling suffered a freak accident with a golf cart just before the second game last year.

The secondary remains intact, with safety Scott Erdmann, who intercepted seven passes in 1976, and hard-hitting cornerbacks Greg Gordon and Lawrence Johnson the standouts. McClain will attempt to resurrect 1977's early-season offense, which died in the last six games. Charles Greene, who started three games last year and threw for 408 yards, will be the quarterback. Second-leading rusher Ira Matthews is back at tailback. David Charles, who has caught 63 passes the last two seasons, also returns.

## Historical Highlights

- 1889—Played first intercollegiate football game.
- 1899—First undefeated season (8-0-1) was recorded under Coach Alden Knipe. Admitted to the Western Conference (Big Ten) Dec. 1.
- 1900—A share of the conference championship highlighted another unbeaten season.
- 1901—Loss to Minnesota ended string of 23 games without defeat.
- 1921—First unbeaten and untied team (7-0) was coached by Howard Jones and won clear Big Ten title.
- 1922—Another perfect season (7-0) included share of conference crown with Michigan.
- 1923—Loss to Illinois ended string of 20 straight victories.
- 1929—Suspended from Big Ten for one year.
- 1939—Dr. Eddie Anderson coached the Iron Men, led by halfback Nile Kinnick, recipient of the Heisman Trophy, the Maxwell Award, and the Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1952—Forest Evashevski named head coach.
- 1955—Guard Cal Jones received the Outland Award.
- 1956—Won the Big Ten and appeared in Rose Bowl for the first time. Finished 9-1 in all games and beat Oregon State at Pasadena.
- 1957—Tackle Alex Karras received the Outland Award.
- 1958—Big Ten champions again and made California a victim in the Rose Bowl. Honors included No. 1 ranking by the Football Writers and Grantland Rice trophy by Look Magazine. Led the nation in total offense. Quarterback Randy Duncan was named the Helms Foundation Player of the Year and received the Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1960—Shared the Big Ten title with Minnesota. Evashevski quit coaching to devote full time to the athletic directorship after the completion of 8-1 season.
- 1961—Shutout by Purdue ended string of 78 games in which one or more touchdowns were scored.
- 1963—Notre Dame game was canceled following the assassination of President Kennedy.
- 1964—Some 28 Iowa and Big Ten records were broken despite 3-6 season.
- 1968—Big Ten scoring and total-offense marks set by Hawkeyes.
- 1969—Black boycott disrupted spring practice.
- 1972—Iowa Stadium was renamed Kinnick Stadium in honor of Iowa's Heisman Trophy winner of 1939. AstroTurf was installed.
- 1973—Bob Commings was named head coach Dec. 15.

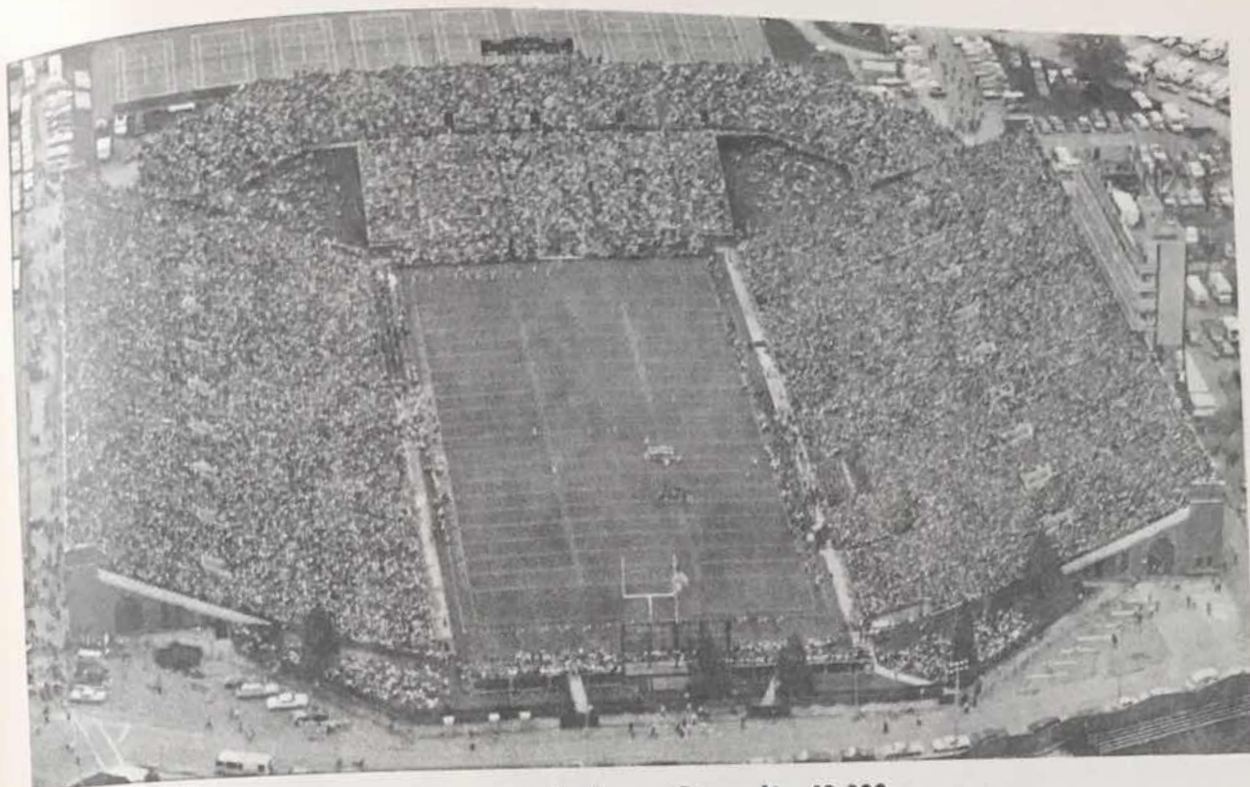

# Herky and the Hawkeyes

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawk-eye was originally applied to a hero in a fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Author Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived and hunted with them.



In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James G. Edwards of Ft. Madison. Edwards, editor of the Ft. Madison *Patriot*, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the *Burlington Hawk-Eye*. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name and were rewarded when territorial officials gave it their formal approval.

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawk, was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism. The impish hawk was an immediate hit and he acquired a name

through a state-wide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 25 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot with a black leather head and gold felt feathers. Since then Herky has become a familiar figure at Hawk-eye athletic events.

## Floyd of Rosedale

A bet in 1935 between Minnesota Governor Floyd B. Olson and Iowa Governor Clyde Herring gave birth to Floyd of Rosedale. Tensions between the two state universities had been running high and a wager was made in an effort to relieve the situation. After Iowa lost the game, Herring presented Olson with Floyd of Rosedale, a full-blooded champion pig and a brother of Blue Boy of Will Rogers's movie, "State Fair." Olson presented the pig to the University of Minnesota and commissioned St. Paul sculptor Charles Brioscho to capture Floyd's image. The result is a bronze pig 21 inches long and 15 inches high. Floyd currently resides in Iowa City as a result of last year's Iowa victory.
