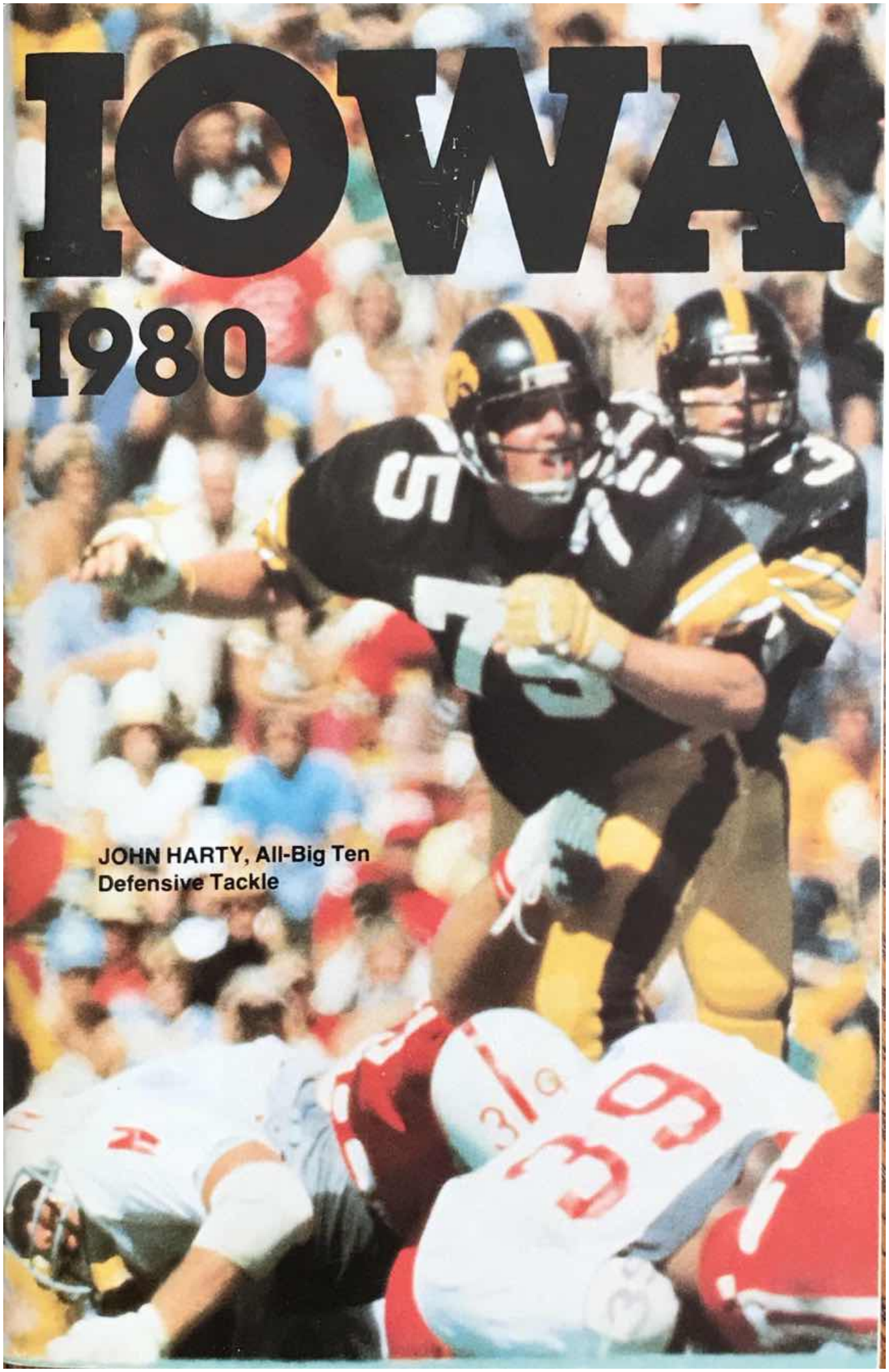

THE UNIVERSITY OF IOWA



From its founding in 1847, The University of Iowa has been an educational pioneer. In 1860 The University of Iowa became the first state university to admit women on an equal basis with men. In 1868 it established the first law school west of the Mississippi River and in 1870 began to develop one of the first university-based medical centers in the Midwest. Today, the University ranks among the Midwest's leading centers of liberal arts, graduate, and professional education.

Located in Iowa City, the University now has an enrollment of more than 23,000 students, over 1,500 faculty members, and a 1,900-acre campus. The University Libraries house more than 2 million volumes and include a Health Science Library, which features a collection of rare books on the history of medicine.

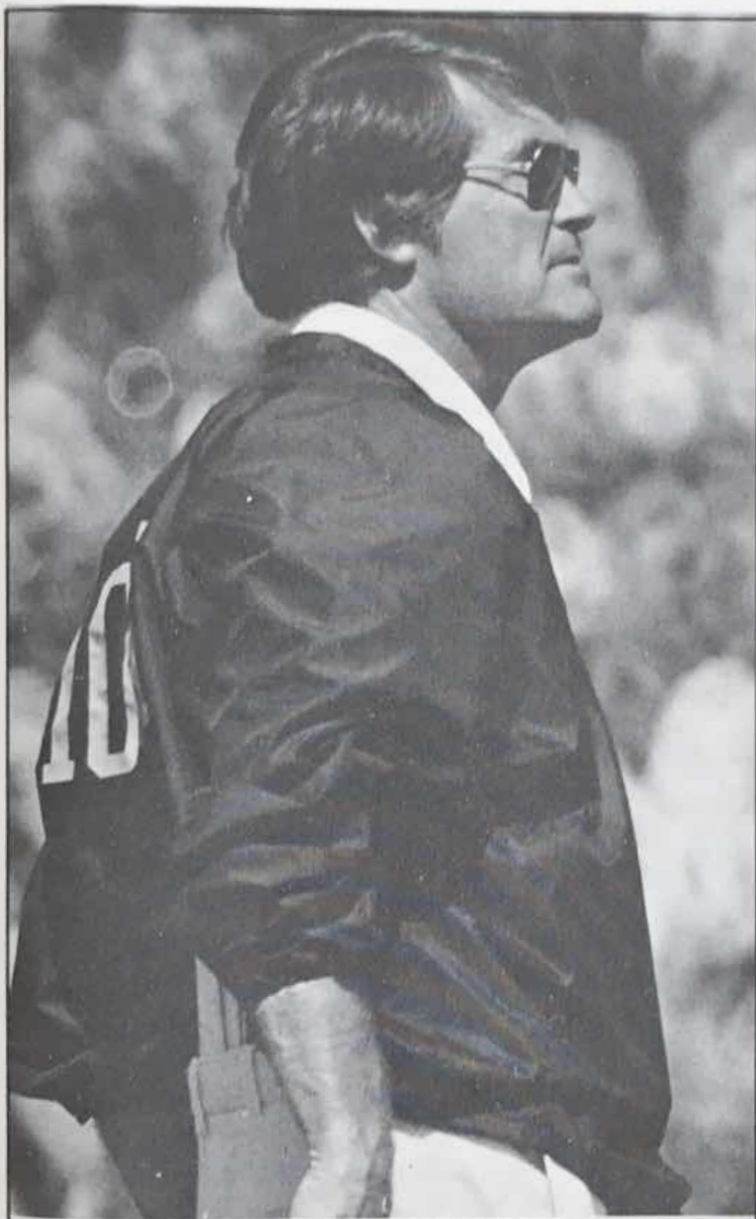
The University is comprised of ten colleges—Liberal Arts, Graduate, Business Administration, Medicine, Engineering, Law, Nursing, Pharmacy, Dentistry, and Education—as well as seven schools—Art and Art History, Journalism and Mass Communication, Letters, Library Science, Music,

Religion, and Social Work.

The University has maintained its tradition as an innovator, originating the interdisciplinary science of speech pathology and pioneering in the acceptance of creative work—painting, sculpture, musical composition, poetry, drama, and fiction writing. Its Writers' Workshop has gained a world reputation in the teaching of creative writing. The International Writers' Workshop, begun by Paul Engel and now under the direction of Hualing Nieh Engle, is the most respected in the world. Under the leadership of James Van Allen, the University has also played a major role in U.S. space programs, such as the current Voyager space probes.

The University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics serve as the apex of a major tertiary health care center, the largest university-owned teaching hospital in the United States. The University's Hancher Auditorium, now in its ninth season, offers concerts, ballet, and theatrical productions, featuring such renowned artists and groups as Vladimir Horowitz, the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, and the Vienna Choir Boys.

Kinnick Stadium is located on the west campus in the heart of the University's athletic complex. It is a few minutes' drive from Interstate 80 and the Iowa City airport, about 30 minutes from the Cedar Rapids airport.

Pressbox at the stadium is on the west side and accessible by elevator. One of the nation's finest, it was completed in 1958 at a cost of \$490,000 (cost to build Kinnick Stadium was \$500,000 in 1929). The first deck has 89 seats for working press. The second deck contains ten booths for radio and television. The third and fourth levels have photo and radio booths and VIP areas. A pregame lunch is served on the first and second decks. The pressbox is 100 feet high and extends between the 25-yard lines.

Press Ticket requests should be directed to George Wine, sports information director. Requests should be filed early enough in advance to allow time for processing.

Athletic Offices are located on the east side of the Iowa Field House. The Field House is also on the west campus, near the stadium.

Haddy became part of the Hawkeye staff in 1971. A native of Cedar Rapids, he holds two degrees from Iowa and has worked for two radio stations. Phil and his wife, Elaine, have a son, Jason, and a daughter, Jamie. Born 9/10/47.

Bump Elliott

Chalmers "Bump" Elliott is in his eleventh year as Iowa's top athletic administrator. He was appointed to the position June 11, 1970, and oversees a staff of 40 men, 11 intercollegiate sports, and a large physical plant. Bump's rise through the Big Ten ranks has been punctuated with success at every stop. Highlights of his tenure at Iowa include 12 Big Ten championships in four sports plus five NCAA wrestling titles.

Elliott has been personally involved in four Big Ten football titles and four Rose Bowl appearances. He was an assistant coach at Iowa for five years and helped build the Hawkeyes into the power of the Big Ten that began with league and bowl championships in 1956.

Iowa won two more Big Ten crowns in the next four years, but Bump was tapped by his alma mater, Michigan, to join the staff there in 1957. He became head coach two years later, and his term as Wolverine boss was highlighted by conference and Rose Bowl wins in 1964. Elliott's 10-year record was 51-42-2 when he quit coaching after the 1968 season to accept administrative duties. After 18 months as Michigan's associate AD, he became athletic director at Iowa.

Elliott played three sports at Michigan in 1946-47-48. A brilliant halfback, he topped the Big Ten in scoring in 1947 with 54 points and spurred the Wolverines to Big Ten and Rose Bowl championships. He led his team in pass receiving and averaged more than five yards a carry. He earned All-America honors, as did his brother Pete, a Michigan quarterback. Bump also played parts of two seasons (1943-44) as a Marine trainee at Purdue. He was selected the Big Ten's MVP in 1947.

Elliott's first coaching job was as an assistant at Oregon State (1948-51). Then he served on the staffs at Iowa (1952-56) and Michigan (1957-58) before becoming head coach there.

Bump is a native of Bloomington, Ill. His father, Dr. J. Norman Elliott, was a physician there and also coached at Illinois Wesleyan and Northwestern. Bump was discharged from the Marines in 1946 and received his degree at Michigan in 1948. He and his wife Barbara have three children: Bill, Bob, and Betsy. All are married. Bump was born in Detroit January 30, 1925.



BILL DERVRICH, Weight-Train- ing Specialist—

He joined the Iowa staff in 1980 and is the school's first strength coach. An all-American prep

football player, he later achieved football and wrestling stardom at West Chester State. He earned all-conference honors in football at the school and was named most valuable on the wrestling team. He did weight training research at Army and was on the Penn State staff before coming to Iowa. He and his wife Terry have no children. Born 1/13/53.

If Iowa's football team wins six games in 1980, Hayden Fry will (1) put the 100th notch in his head-coaching gun, and (2) become the first man since 1961 to lead the Hawkeyes to a winning season. Those are reasonable goals for a man like Hayden, who enters his 19th season of head coaching with a record of 94-95-4, a worksheet compiled while rebuilding ailing programs at Southern Methodist, North Texas State, and Iowa.

Fry says he likes to take bad football teams and make them good, which he has accomplished at all three coaching stops. His peers consider him a daring and innovative coach who can win without superior personnel, a man who will do what is least expected. Hayden characterizes himself as a coach who will take what you give him and "scratch where it itches."

After becoming Iowa's head coach December 9, 1978, Hayden was not bashful about his promises in rebuilding a team that had won only twice the previous season. He said he would make the Hawkeyes competitive, colorful, tough, and exciting. He said he would produce the school's first 1,000-

yard rusher and his team would throw a lot of passes. He delivered on all counts, leading the Hawkeyes through a highly enjoyable 5-6 campaign and very nearly upsetting three bowl-bound teams. Iowa finished in the Big Ten's first division for the first time in 10 years.

Record home attendance proved Fry had perked up the sagging Iowa program, just as he did at SMU and North Texas. At SMU, where he coached 11 years (1962-72), Hayden put the Mustangs in three bowl games with a freewheeling, wide-open style of football.

In 1963, his second season, SMU received a Sun Bowl invitation. His 1966 team won the Southwest Conference championship with an 8-3 record, which is still SMU's best season since 1948. That team played in the Cotton Bowl.

Fry took his team in 1968 to the Bluebonnet Bowl, where it whipped Oklahoma, thus making him the only coach who has had teams in the three major bowls in Texas. His record at SMU was 49-66-1 and he was athletic director his last nine years at the school.

Hayden was coach and AD for six years at North Texas (1973-78), inheriting a sick program and making it a big winner (33-11) in his final four years there. Included were seasons of 10-1 in 1977 and 9-2 in 1978, the fourth best record in the nation during that two-year period. His record at North Texas, which won only seven games in the four seasons prior to his arrival, was 40-23-3.

Hayden has the reputation of being an offensive-minded coach, which is well-earned. His 1968 SMU team, for instance, went to Ohio State and put the ball in the air 76 times! It was an NCAA record that stood for 12 seasons.

Fry likes to open up his offense and use a bit of razzle-dazzle, but he believes that success starts with sound defense. His 1978 North Texas team

proved that, winning nine games and leading the nation in three defensive categories: interceptions, return yardage, and takeaways.

Named the Texas College Coach of the Year four times, Hayden broke the color barrier in the Southwest Conference when he recruited Jerry Levias, a black wide receiver, at SMU. He has attracted outstanding assistants, including Bum Phillips, now head coach of the Houston Oilers.

A second cousin of the late President Lyndon B. Johnson, Fry has served many years on the UPI coaches panel and is active in the American College Football Coaches Association. He has coached in several postseason all-star games, including the Hula Bowl, the East-West Shrine Game, and the Blue-Gray Game.

A native of Odessa, Texas, Hayden was an all-state quarterback there and led his team to the 1946 Texas high school championship. He was named most valuable player at the Texas prep all-star game that year and enrolled at Baylor, where he played four years (1947-50). He quarterbacked the Bears to a 26-13 record and earned a degree in psychology in 1951.

Fry was a player-coach with the Quantico Marines (he reached the rank of captain), head coach in his hometown of Odessa three years (1956-58), assistant to John Bridgers at Baylor two seasons (1959-60), and an aide to Frank Broyles at Arkansas in 1961 before moving to SMU as head coach.

An entertaining public speaker, Hayden has made hundreds of appearances before various groups since he arrived in Iowa. He was born in Eastland, Texas, February 28, 1929. His wife's name is Shirley and he is the father of four sons, Randy, Zach, Kelly, and Adrian and a daughter, Robin.

Randy, Zach, and Kelly played for him at North Texas.

BARRY ALVAREZ, Linebackers—

A former all-Big Eight linebacker at Nebraska, he coached Mason City to the 1978 Iowa AAAA state title. He joined the Iowa staff in 1979 after three years at Mason City. He also coached at Lincoln and Lexington in Nebraska and has a high school career record of 37-13. He has been named Coach of the Year in both Iowa and Nebraska. He played in the Orange and Sugar bowls while at Nebraska and in the postseason Blue-Gray and Senior Bowl games in 1968. Barry and his wife Cindy have two daughters (Dawn and Stacey) and a son (Chad). Born 12/30/46.

BILL BRASHIER, Defensive Coordinator and Defensive Backs—

A veteran defensive coach, he spent 11 years on the North Texas State staff before coming to Iowa in 1979. He has been a head coach at high schools in San Antonio and Freer, Texas. He was a three-year starter at North Texas State as a defensive back, quarterback, and punter. He still holds the school record for career pass interceptions with 19. His 10 interceptions during the 1951 season is also a school record. He holds two degrees from North Texas State. A navy veteran, Bill and his wife Ann have two sons (Randy and Scott) and a daughter (Lee Ann). Born 5/30/29.

HOWARD CISSELL, Defensive Ends—

A former Canadian pro player,

he was at North Texas State six years before joining the Hawkeye staff in 1979. He played for three years with the Montreal Alouettes and was named all-CFL one season. He has a total of ten years as a high school head coach in Arkansas. He lettered four years in football and track as a halfback and hurdler at Arkansas State. He holds degrees from Arkansas State and the State College of Arkansas. He and his wife Jane are the parents of two sons (Howard and Jon) and a daughter (Deanna). Born 8/21/36.

CLOVIS HALE, Offensive Line—A native of Roscoe, Texas, he joined the Iowa staff in 1979 after spending one year at North Texas State. He served as head football coach at Lake View high school in San Angelo, Texas, for five years. He has served apprenticeships under Baylor Coach Grant Teaff and Texas Coach Fred Akers. He lettered twice at McMurry College (Texas) and was named the school's outstanding lineman his senior year. He and wife Jean have two sons (Joe Bill and Dusty). Born 10/23/41.

CARL JACKSON, Running Backs—A former collegiate academic all-American, he came to Iowa in 1979 after three years at North Texas State. He served as a high school coach in Port Arthur and Aldine, Texas. A four-year letterman in football, basketball, and track as a prep in Bay City, Texas, he

went on to collegiate stardom at Prairie View A&M. He placed third nationally (NAIA) in the long jump in 1961 and second in 1962. He holds two degrees from Prairie View A&M. He and his wife Doris have a son (Carl) and a daughter (Cheryl). Born 8/16/40.

DAN McCARNEY, Defensive Line—A cocaptain at Iowa in 1974, he joined the Hawkeye staff in 1977. He was an offensive guard at Iowa and was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons. He served as a graduate assistant at Iowa before joining the full-time staff. He lettered three times at Iowa. He holds a degree from Iowa and is a bachelor. Born 7/28/53.

DEL MILLER, Receivers—A three-year letterman at Central College, he coached high school teams at Plainfield and Eagle Grove before coming to Iowa in 1978. A five-sport letterman at Iowa Valley in Marengo, he was all-state in football and basketball and played for a state championship team in 1968. He and his wife Jan have three sons (Troy, Todd, and Tad). Born 11/6/50.

DON PATTERSON, Defensive Backs—He played at the U.S. Military Academy, then coached several service teams while in the army. He coached at North Texas State one season prior to coming to Iowa in 1979. In addition to helping coach the defensive backs, he is the Hawkeyes' recruiting coordinator. A

native Texan, he is the only athlete in the history of Blooming Grove high school to letter in six sports. He and his wife Lisa have a daughter (Brooke). Born 12/10/50.

BILL SNYDER, Offensive Coordinator, Quarterbacks-Receivers—A native of Saint Joseph, Missouri, he is a graduate of William Jewell College. He was an honorable mention all-American as a defensive back. He came to Iowa in 1979 after spending three years at North Texas State. He served as offensive coordinator and swimming coach at Austin (Texas) College. He was a head high school coach for five years in California and served as a graduate assistant under John McKay at Southern Cal. He holds degrees from William Jewell and Eastern New Mexico. He is the father of a son (Sean) and two daughters (Shannon and Meredith). Born 10/7/41.

BERNIE WYATT, Tight Ends—An all-America prep at Amityville, N.Y., he starred for Iowa in the defensive backfield and was his team's most valuable player in 1960. He had seven career pass interceptions and played in the Blue-Gray all-star game following his senior year. He joined the Hawkeye staff in 1974 after coaching in high schools in Iowa and New York. He and his wife Barbara have two sons (Brad and Barry). Born 8/21/38.

It's not hard to get excited about Iowa's 1980 football team. The Hawkeyes return 13 starters and most top reserves from a club that made enormous strides last season. They finished with a 5-6 record, including five wins in their final eight games. A 4-4 record in the Big Ten was good for fifth place, Iowa's first first-division finish since 1970. A productive, wide-open offense was instrumental in the upswing, but the defense made the most significant improvement, ranking fourth in the conference in both points and yards allowed.

How close did the Hawkeyes come to an 8-3 record and postseason bowl game? They lost to Indiana 30-26 after owning a 26-3 halftime advantage, they lost to Nebraska 24-21 after leading 21-7 with 17 minutes left in the game, and they lost to Purdue 20-14 when a fourth-down pass fell incomplete in the end zone in the final minute. An exceptionally talented group of recruits who will join the squad in August heighten enthusiasm for the 1980 Hawkeyes.

Now temper the optimism with a dose of realism. Gone is Dennis Mosley, the all-American tailback who led the Big

Ten in rushing and scoring en route to setting several school records, including 1,267 yards rushing. Also missing is all-Big Ten linebacker Leven Weiss, powerful tight end Jim Swift and wide receiver Brad Reid, Iowa's leading pass receiver the last two seasons. Will capable replacements be found? Iowa had few injuries (no major surgery) last year. Can that happen again? Will a schedule that includes five opponents coming off bowl appearances not stop the Hawkeyes from enjoying their first winning season since 1961? If the answers to these questions are yes, the outlook is extremely bright for Iowa football in 1980.

"We were disappointed we did not have a winning season last year," said Coach Hayden Fry, who inherited a club that posted a 2-9 record in 1978. "We lost a couple of games because we lost our poise. The mental aspect of this game is very important and now we believe we can win. We had a good spring practice, much better than my first year at Iowa. Our no. 1 units are better and our depth is improved. But we lost some quality seniors—young men who were intelligent leaders—and we play some tough people both in and out of the Big Ten. We can have a good season, but it's going to take a lot of hard work and a little luck."

THE OFFENSE: Six starters return from a unit that produced 239 points and 3,799 yards. For the first time in 12 years the Hawkeyes have an established quarterback. Phil Suess, a 6-5 lefty who Fry rescued from the scout squad, completed 55 percent of his passes for 1,165 yards even though an injury limited him to six starts. Gordy Bohannon and Pete Gales, who both triggered Iowa to victory in 1979, provide strong competition.

The offensive line, built around all-Big Ten center Jay Hilgenberg, will be solid. Keith Chappelle leads a veteran corps of pass receivers and Dean McKillip returns at fullback. They are called the most improved offensive players by Fry, who says: "McKillip is a good blocker who has developed into a fine runner. Chappelle could always catch the ball and now he's learned how to run with it."

Dwayne Williams, used sparingly at tailback last year, and Jeff Brown, a converted wide receiver, are hopeful of replacing Mosley. But neither gained a strong hold on the job in spring drills. "Somebody is going to have to come through at running back for us to have a consistent offense," says Fry, who does not rule out the possibility of rookies becoming a factor at the position.

Fry's attack uses multiple sets and keeps opponents guessing. Iowa tends to have no offensive tendencies. "I think we'll move the ball again," says Hayden. "Replacing Mosley and Swift, who was a great blocker, will be our major problems, but our offensive line has some depth. The three quarterbacks are gifted in different areas and we will modify our attack to capitalize on the strength of each. All three are capable of leading us to a winning season."

THE DEFENSE: The head coach doesn't try to hide his enthusiasm when he talks about the front seven. "They are awesome, they're super," enthused Hayden several times during spring drills. "I don't think you're going to see many offensive lines handle us when the shooting starts next fall. Believe me when I tell you we have good defensive linemen and linebackers."

Who are these guys, anyway? Start with John Harty, who has earned all-Big Ten honors a couple of times and could become an all-American his senior

season. End Andre Tippett and linebacker Todd Simonsen are both capable of gaining lofty postseason honors. Other top men up front are noseguard Pat Dean, end Bryan Skradis, tackle Mark Bortz, and linebacker Mel Cole. Tippett, Simonsen, and Dean were given the "most improved" label after spring drills.

Reviews on the secondary are not as glowing, but Fry says the unit is sounder than a year ago when Iowa ranked tenth in the Big Ten in pass defense. "We don't have the speed yet, but we have intelligent players with good experience," he explains. "If we get the kind of pass rush I anticipate, we'll be OK." Bobby Stoops and Kent Ellis were among the top pass interceptors in the Big Ten last season, and they will be joined in the secondary by Kevin Ellis (Kent's twin) and Tracy Crocker.

Iowa uses a 5-2 defense with a reckless style that produced 36 take-aways in 1979. "We came a long way last year," recalls Fry. "We stopped Illinois and Wisconsin at the goal line to preserve victories, and we held Ohio State to less than 200 yards total offense. But we're still improving. We're going to have a strong pass rush and we're going to be hard to run against. We could be very strong defensively."

KICKING GAME: Reggie Roby, then a freshman, took over all punting and kicking duties early last season, won all-Big Ten honors, and missed winning the conference punting crown by two-tenths of a yard (42.6 average). He missed most of spring drills with an ankle injury and will be hard pressed by Lonnie Olejniczak and Scott Schilling, who handled placements and kickoffs in 1978.

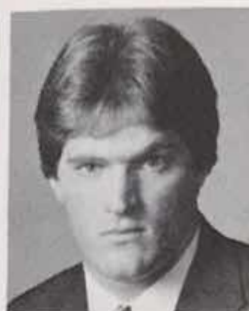

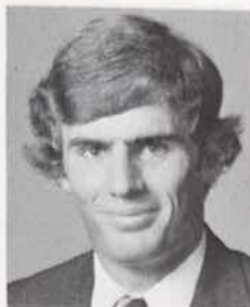

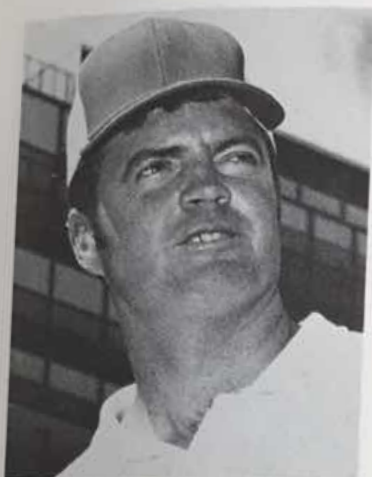

Indiana comes off its best season in more than a decade. The 1979 Hoosiers were 8-4, fourth in the Big Ten, a 38-37 Holiday Bowl winner, and held national rankings of 16 and 19. Prospects look even better in 1980. The offense, headed by Big Ten MVP Tim Clifford at quarterback and tailback Mike Harkrader, lost just four starters and appears able to replace them adequately. A young and untried defense learned the hard way in 1979 but returns nine of 11 starters, led by cornerback Tim Wilbur, all-Big Ten selection and Indiana's all-time leader in pass interceptions. The Hoosier offense should put a lot of points on the board, but Indiana's success rests largely on its defense improving.

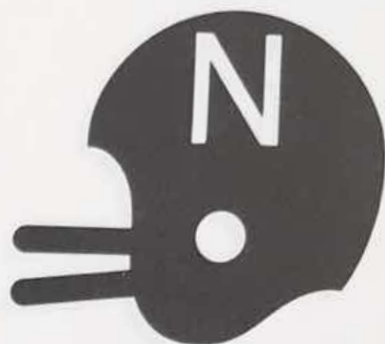

The Outlook

Quarterback Mark Herrmann returns hopeful of a Heisman Trophy. Herrmann, who threw for 1,619 yards in the Big Ten, will have a veteran receiving corps, led by all-America tight end Dave Young, the Big Ten's top receiver in 1979, and split end Bart Burrell, sixth in the league. The Boilermakers have lost five defensive starters from the unit which was second in the Big Ten in total defense. Defensive tackle Calvin Clark and cornerback Bill Kay, who tied for the Big Ten lead in interceptions, anchor the defense for last year's Bluebonnet Bowl winners. The winningest Big Ten team over the past two years, Purdue is suspect in the offensive line, where only two regulars are back, and in the kicking game. Only two of eight field goal attempts were good in 1979 and three punters could average only 36 yards.

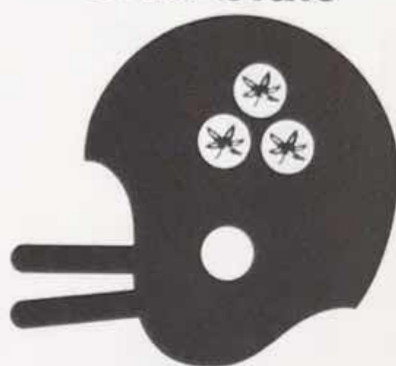

The Outlook

Michigan State football faces a heavy rebuilding year in 1980. New Coach Frank (Muddy) Waters inherits a unit that went 5-6 in 1979 and lost 20 lettermen from the 1979 club. State has no established quarterback and faces personnel problems at offensive and defensive tackles, inside linebackers, and tight end. MSU possesses an excellent kicking game with the presence of all-American punter Ray Stachowicz (44.3 average) and placekicker Morten Andersen, who hit all of his 25 extra points. The Spartans have fine runners in tailbacks Steve Smith (leading ground gainer with 974 yards in 1979) and Bruce Reeves, and in fullbacks Derek Hughes and Andy Schramm. The Spartans also have a potentially solid receiving corps with the likes of Samson Howard and Jim Williams. The defense appears to be spotty, except in the secondary where James Burroughs and Rick Milhizer return.

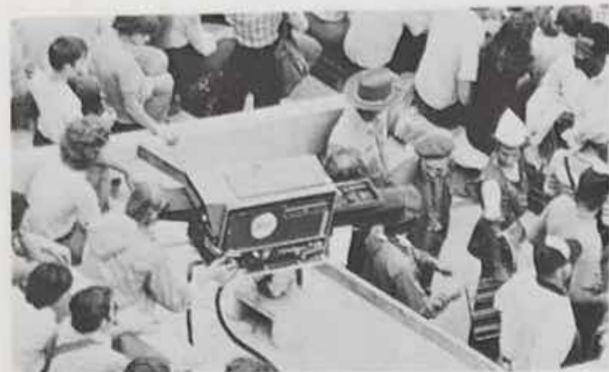

Seven men have been named to the Halls of both foundations: Howard Jones, coach; Nile Kinnick, player; Gordon Locke, player; Fred (Duke) Slater, player; Dr. Edward Anderson, coach; Edward (Slip) Madigan, coach; Calvin Jones, player.

Four men have been named to the Hall of the Helms Foundation: Calvin Jones, player; Ossie Solem, coach; Emlen Tunnell, professional player; Eric Wilson, publicist.

Aubrey Devine was named to the NFF Hall as a player.

Iowa's All-Time Team

The selection of Nile Kinnick as the greatest player ever to perform for the Hawkeyes highlights the naming of Iowa's all-time football team. Fans selected the team as part of the Big Ten's seventy-fifth anniversary celebration in 1970. Calvin Jones received more votes than any other player, but in a separate ballot Kinnick got the greatest player nod over Jones by a

sizable margin. Kinnick received the Heisman, Maxwell, and Walter Camp trophies in 1939. Jones won the Outland Trophy in 1955.

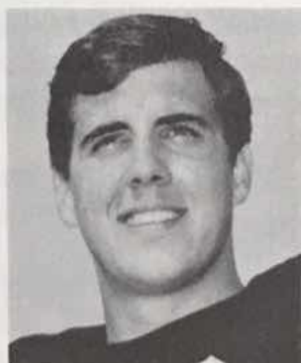

Historical Highlights

- 1889—Played first intercollegiate football game.
- 1899—First undefeated season (8-0-1) was recorded under Coach Alden Knipe. Admitted to the Western conference (Big Ten) Dec. 1.
- 1900—A share of the conference championship highlighted another unbeaten season.
- 1901—Loss to Minnesota ended string of 23 games without defeat.
- 1921—First unbeaten and untied team (7-0) was coached by Howard Jones and won clear Big Ten title.
- 1922—Another perfect season (7-0) included share of conference crown with Michigan.
- 1923—Loss to Illinois ended string of 20 straight victories.
- 1929—Suspended from Big Ten for one year.
- 1939—Dr. Eddie Anderson coached the Iron-Men, led by halfback Nile Kinnick, recipient of the Heisman Trophy, the Maxwell Award, and the Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1952—Forest Evashevski named head coach.
- 1955—Guard Cal Jones received the Outland Award.
- 1956—Won the Big Ten and appeared in Rose Bowl for the first time. Finished 9-1 in all games and beat Oregon State at Pasadena.
- 1957—Tackle Alex Karras received the Outland Award.
- 1958—Big Ten champions again and made California a victim in the Rose Bowl. Honors included No. 1 ranking by the Football Writers and Grantland Rice trophy by Look Magazine. Led the nation in total offense. Quarterback Randy Duncan was named the Helms Foundation Player of the Year and received the Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1960—Shared the Big Ten title with Minnesota. Evashevski quit coaching to devote full time to the athletic directorship after the completion of 8-1 season.
- 1961—Shutout by Purdue ended string of 78 games in which one or more touchdowns were scored.
- 1963—Notre Dame game was canceled following the assassination of President Kennedy.
- 1964—Some 28 Iowa and Big Ten records were broken despite 3-6 season.
- 1968—Big Ten scoring and total-offense marks set by Hawkeyes.
- 1969—Black boycott disrupted spring practice.
- 1972—Iowa Stadium was renamed Kinnick Stadium in honor of Iowa's Heisman Trophy winner of 1939. AstroTurf was installed.
- 1978—Hayden Fry named head coach Dec. 9.



Herky and the Hawkeyes

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawkeye was originally applied to a hero in a fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Author Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived and hunted with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James G. Edwards of Fort Madison. Edwards, editor of the Fort Madison *Patriot*, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the *Burlington Hawk-Eye*. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name and were rewarded when territorial officials gave it their formal approval.

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawk, was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism. The impish hawk was an immediate hit and he acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 30 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot with a black leather head and gold felt feathers. Since then Herky has become a familiar figure at Hawkeye athletic events.

Floyd of Rosedale

A bet in 1935 between Minnesota Governor Floyd B. Olson and Iowa Governor Clyde Herring gave birth to Floyd of Rosedale. Tensions between the two state universities had been running high and a wager was made in an effort to relieve the situation. After Iowa lost the game, Herring presented Olson with Floyd of Rosedale, a full-blooded champion pig and a brother of Blue Boy of Will Rogers' movie, *State Fair*. Olson presented the pig to the University of Minnesota and commissioned Saint Paul sculptor Charles Brioscho to capture Floyd's image. The result is a bronze pig 21 inches long and 15 inches high. Floyd currently resides in Minneapolis as a result of last year's Minnesota victory.
